### **Dear Parents/Carers**

#### Soft Start

Our Soft Start to the day, introduced in September 2018, has made several really positive differences. It has resulted in a calmer and more relaxed start to the school day for everyone, removed congestion in the entrances, halls and on the stairs. It has helped children to develop greater independence in their behaviour and given them the opportunity to work on a range of activities to build on and embed their learning. In addition, learning now starts promptly at 9.00am, as the children have already been registered and are ready in their classrooms.

The playground opens at 8.30am and parents/carers are welcome to bring their children and wait with them in the playground from this time. However, please can we remind parents/carers that soft start begins at 8.45am and children MUST NOT be left in the playground before this time.

Parents/carers can only leave children earlier than 8.45am, if they are 4 years or older **AND** going to Breakfast club in the Lodge. Breakfast Club starts at 8.00am each morning and your child must be registered to attend.

### **Attendance and Punctuality**

All the education research shows that attendance and punctuality are vital to children's education outcomes. So, please ensure that your child attends school regularly and on time.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT NUT ALLERGIES

Please DO NOT send nuts or food containing nuts into school with your child. We have a number of children with nut allergies and nuts pose a serious health risk to them.

Please can we remind parents/carers that while they can take photographs and record videos of their children during our assemblies, school productions, nativity and other school events, they MUST NOT post any images or video content onto any form of social media.

### Conurbation

### Safer Internet Day

Tuesday 5th February was Safer Internet Day and this year it focused on how consent works in an online context, in terms of giving and receiving consent online in friendships, how children take and share images and videos and how they manage their privacy and data. There was lots of discussion in the classrooms about staying safe online. In addition, using laptops and iPads, the children took part in various Internet activities during the day, using some of the resources available on:

### **Limitless Possibilities**


We have a brilliant new display on one of the boards on the stairs which is called Limitless Possibilities. What this shows is the number of hugely successful people have who various conditions. For example, did you know that Einstein, who developed the theory of relativity, was autistic? Did you know Michael that Phelps. the most successful Olympian of all time has ADHD? Did you know that the entrepreneur and highly successful businessman, Richard Branson has



dyslexia? What this tells us is that there are no limits to what children can achieve. All children have talents and the capacity to learn, and what they all need is nurturing and encouragement to learn and develop to fulfil their potential.

### **Children's Mobile Phones**

We understand parents/carers allowing their child to bring a mobile phone to school if they walk to and from school without adult supervision. However, no other pupils should bring mobile phones to school due to potential problems, such as loss, theft or bullying, arising from this. When a child needs to bring a phone into school it must be left in the school office at the start of the day and collected at the end of the day. Children should not bring any earphones into school because they pose a risk of children not paying attention to traffic and what is going on around them. Parents/carers are advised that Pakeman Primary School accepts no liability for the loss or damage to mobile phones which are brought into school or school grounds. If any pupil is found by a member of staff to be using a mobile phone during the school day, the phone will be confiscated from the pupil and kept in the school office. The parents/carers will



be informed and disciplinary action will be taken in line with our Behaviour Policy. The child will be able to collect the phone from the school office at the end of the day, but if this happens again, the school will confiscate the phone until their parent/carer collects the phone from a senior teacher.

### Perform workshops

On Wednesday the performing arts school, 'Perform', came into school and provided EYFS and KS1 with free drama workshops around the theme of 'Heroes'.
