Learning about Plastics

This week, Pakeman hosted some guests from Yerbury Primary School as part of our collaboration with the Science for Life project. Marika's Adventure

Congratulations to Marika, our recorder and saxophone teacher, for an absolutely amazing achievement. This is an account of Marika's adventure in her own words:

When I entered the TransAtlantic Way Ride the furthest I had ridden was 500km over 3 days, and that was my idea of a huge achievement. That was at the end of last year. Then, suddenly, I got the opportunity to participate in a 2000km, non-supported, organised ultra-endurance cycling race. That means that the clock is always ticking and no one is going to help you roll out your sleeping bag in the woods. I spent the last 6 months training and researching bikepacking gear before getting to the starting line on the 6th June.

It was a terrifically hard route, following the whole, wiggly west coast of Ireland, with continuous impressive and dramatic scenery. It tested my physical and, to a larger degree, mental strength. I suffered a couple of repetitive use injuries and, knowing that they weren't going to go away, I still had 700km to go, which took an awful lot of willpower.

My favourite parts were when I was talking to locals over my third service station meal of the day, explaining what I'm doing and putting myself through. Without fail, they would say "Well, fair play to ya!". The other riders were what gave the race a soul, I learnt so much about Irish history from a few Irish competitors, riding around Achill Island and the Cliff of Moher.

I will never forget Donegal County's sudden gradients, or climbing Connor Pass to get to the Dingle Peninsula. I was tired and broken, but when I crossed into County Cork, the home stretch, I felt so happy just to still be on a bike and seeing each amazing stretch of coastline.
