experiences for maths this week.





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
My Skin Your Skin is a story book which explores the concept of racism, explaining what it is and why it is always wrong. It examines what makes people unique,

Year 5 and 6 have been busy creating fantastic art inspired by their WW2 topic. Firstly, they created scenes from the Blitz, which caused thousands of children to be evacuated.
