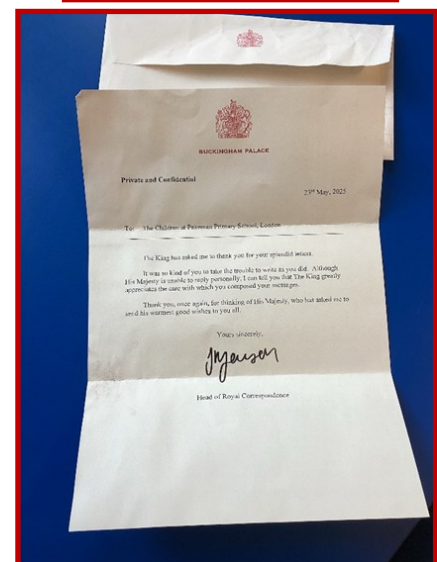
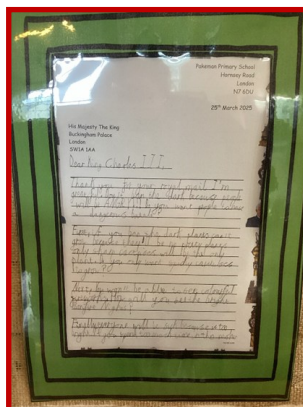
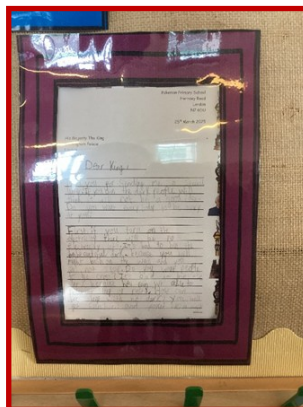
Pakeman Volunteers

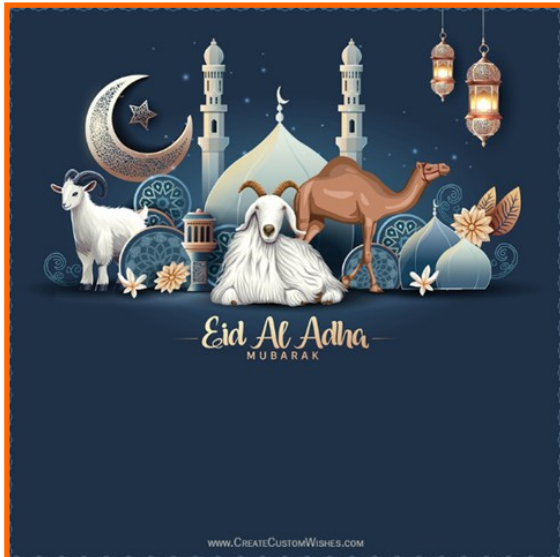
